



### "We Heard ..."

Support for more limited improvement that fit with the character of Wonderland Lake.

#### **High - moderate support** for actions related to:

- Shoreline and habitat restoration, conservation, and protections
- Lake health
- · Repairing trails
- Improved fishing delineation and access
  - Subgroup support fishing people

- Bike racks
- Public restrooms
  - Subgroup support those who do not live in North Boulder
- Water fountain

### For many, the existing conditions are adequate.

#### Low support for actions related to:

- Trailside structures (bird blinds, wildlife observation areas, picnic tables)
- Other trail modifications

- Accessibility improvements
- Other amenities or public use at the Foothills Nature Center

OSMP Operational Needs



- Significantly less change than proposed in the previous 2018 concepts
- More minimal infrastructure with much remaining the same to current conditions
- Actions focused on providing visitor amenities with community support, those that provide equitable access and support interests across the community, and those that met OSMP's minimal operational needs
- Pier, boardwalk and wading no longer considered




### Preliminary Package of Actions - Majority Support

Theme	Support & Somewhat Support	Do not Support
Wetland and shoreline habitat and wildlife conservation and protection on the north, west, and south sides of the Lake	81%	19%
Access to, conservation of, and activities on the on the east side of the Lake (along the dam and peninsula)	71%	29%
Educational Experiences and Interpretive Signs	74%	26%
Wonderland Lake Trailhead and Foothills Nature Center/Facility Improvements	64%	36%



# Wetland and Shoreline Habitat and Wildlife Conservation and Protection on the North, West, and South Sides of the Lake

#### ISP Actions - Operational Needs

#1: Better define the "no public access area" to protect wetland habitat by:

- enacting an 8.3.3 regulatory closure,
- completing the fence lines, and
- adding limited signs

#2: Prohibit boats and belly boats on Wonderland Lake


#3: Relocate the existing southwest access point further south to eliminate to avoid damaging wetlands


#4: Add a vehicle turnaround spot near the existing southwest access point

#5: Opportunistically add more woody structure in the lake for fish and amphibian habitat (e.g. downed trees, logs)








### Access to Wonderland Lake Area





Improve safety at Broadway crossing by coordinating with transportation to create a safe and visible crosswalk.









# Access to, Conservation of, and Activities on the east side of Wonderland Lake (along the dam and peninsula)

#### ISP Actions - Operational Needs

#10: Update regulatory signs to accurately reflect regulations and allowed activities.

#11: Extend fencing south along the dam to prevent people from cutting across the spillway.

#### ISP Actions - Community Input

#12: Designate and construct 2-3 1-2 fishing access paths, consisting of rocky steps, from the Wonderland Lake Trail down to the water's edge along dam.

#13: Do not prohibit (allow at own risk) ice skating

#14: Do not designate an area on the Wonderland Lake dam for sledding (sledding remains prohibited).

#15: Restore peninsula habitat.



Construct 2-3 1-2 fishing access paths, consisting of rocky steps, from the Wonderland Lake Trail down to the water's edge along dam.






### ISP Actions #10, #13, and #14

#14: Do not designate an area on the Wonderland Lake dam for sledding (sledding remains prohibited)

#13: Do not prohibit (allow at own risk) ice skating

#10: Update regulatory signs to accurately reflect regulations and allowed activities

- Sledding (prohibited)
- Ice skating (dangerous and allowed at own risk)
- Fishing (allowed where designated)
- Wading (prohibited)

#18: Add temporary education sign(s) on the peninsula about and during the restoration





# Wonderland Lake Trailhead and Foothills Nature Center/Facilities Improvements

#### ISP Actions - Operational Needs

#19: Renovate the Nature Center within the existing footprint/operational area to accommodate OSMP operational needs.

#20: Minor reconfiguration of the parking lot

#21: Replace kiosk and signs.

### ISP Actions Proposed for Public Input

#22: Install additional and updated bike racks at the trailhead.

#23: Add <u>public</u> restrooms near the trailhead at the Foothills Nature Center shed site.

#24: Provide a small gathering area with shade trees and small rocks for visitors and small groups near the trailhead kiosk.


#25: Add a public water fountain at the Foothills Nature Center near the restrooms



# Wonderland Lake Trailhead and Foothills Nature Center/Facilities Improvements

#### ISP Actions Proposed for Public Input

#23: Add <u>public</u> restrooms near the trailhead at the Foothills Nature Center shed site.



- Restroom/toilet is a "standard facility" at trailheads with high levels of visitation (water fountain is an "optional facility")
- Majority of participants support it (69%)
- Community concerns can be addressed through design features and maintenance and operational protocols.
- Planned updates include installing plumbed facilities to support OSMP staff operations.





  - Natural Areas
  - Passive Recreation Areas (Wonderland Lake)
    - to provide a high level of public access,
    - maintain or improve recreational and educational opportunities, while protecting and preserving resources,
    - accommodate high levels of visitor use with appropriate infrastructure and services.


### Peninsula Restoration



### Focus of peninsula restoration:

- Low cost and low effort
- Includes seeding and fencing

Cost Estimate: \$10,000



### Focus of shoreline restoration:

- Manage erosion
- Improve habitat
- Provide a waterfront visitor experience that discourages wading/water access

Cost Estimate: \$75,000-100,000
