7	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BOULDER,				
8	COLORADO:				
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10	Section 1. Section 3-2-6, "Exempt Property and Services," B.R.C. 1981, is amended to				
11	read as follows:				
12	3-2-6. Exempt Property and Services.				
13 14	Purchase, sale, or use of the following property and services is exempt from taxation under this chapter:				
14	(a) Services, not otherwise taxable under this chapter, whose price is separately stated from the price of tangible personal property with which the services are sold;				
16	(b) Services, not otherwise taxable under this chapter, whose price is not separately stated				
17	from the price of tangible personal property with which the services are sold, but that is calculated as a percentage of the total sales price of the property, and approved as exempt				
18	by the city manager upon written request;				
19	(y) Construction materials purchased by the responsible person to be used for installation,				
20	use or consumption on job sites or building construction addresses if:(1)The value of the construction materials was included in determining the valuation of the				
21	construction;(2)The vendor records on the invoice of sale the job site address and, when applicable, the building permit number; and(3)The contractor has prepaid the tax directly				
22	to the City as permitted in Chapter 3-16.				
23	(z) The disposable bag fee as established in Chapter 6-15, "Disposable Bag Fee," B.R.C.				
24	<u>1981.</u>				
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1	Section 2. Chapter 6-15, "Disposable Bag Fee," B.R.C. 1981, is amended to read as			
2	follows:			
3	6-15-1. Legislative Intent and Purpose.			
4	(a) Purpose. It is the purpose of this chapter to protect the public health and safety and			
5	implement the city's Climate Action Plan, Zero Waste Master Plan, and the Boulder Valley Comprehensive Plan.			
6	(b) Findings. The city council finds as follows:			
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8	(4) Boulder consumers use approximately 14.3 million disposable bags from food			
9	stores each year; and			
10	$(\underline{45})$ The city's taxpayers bear the costs associated with the effects of disposable bags			
11	on the solid waste stream, drainage, litter, and wildlife.			
12	(c) Intent. The disposable bag fee is necessary to address the environmental problems associated with disposable bags and to relieve city taxpayers of the costs imposed upon			
13	the city associated with the use of disposable bags. The city council intends that the requirements of this chapter will assist in offsetting the costs associated with using			
14	disposable bags to pay for the mitigation, educational, replacement, and administrative efforts of the city.			
15	6-15-2. Definitions.			
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17	The following terms used in this chapter have the following meanings unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:			
18	<i>Carryout bag</i> means a bag that is furnished to a customer at a store or retail food			
19	establishment at the point of sale for use by the customer to transport or carry purchased items.			
20	Carryout bag does not include:			
21	(a) Bags used by consumers inside stores to:			
22	(1) Package bulk items, such as fruit, vegetables, nuts, grains, candy, small hardware			
23	 items, or live insects, fish, crustaceans, mollusks, or other small species; (2) Contain or wrap frozen foods, meat or fish; 			
24	(3) Contain or wrap flowers, potted plants, bulk seed, bulk livestock feed, bulk pet			
25	feed, or other items where dampness may be a problem;			

1	(4) Contain unwrapped prepared foods or bakery goods; or			
2	(5) A non-handled bag used to protect a purchased item from damaging or			
2	contaminating other purchased items when placed in a recycled paper carryout bag or reusable carryout bag.			
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4	(b) Bags provided by pharmacists to contain prescription drugs.			
5	(c) Newspaper bags, door-hanger bags, laundry-dry cleaning bags or bags sold in packages containing multiple bags for uses such as food storage, garbage, pet waste or yard waste.			
6 7	(d) A bag made of paper when the paper has a basis weight of thirty pounds or less.			
8	<i>Disposable bag</i> means a <u>carryout</u> bag that is not a reusable <u>carryout</u> bag. <u>Disposable bag</u> includes single-use plastic carryout bag and recycled paper carryout bag.			
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10	Disposable bag does not include:			
11	(a) Bags used by consumers inside stores to:			
	(1) Package bulk items, such as fruit, vegetables, nuts, grains, candy or small			
12	hardware items;			
13	(2) Contain or wrap frozen foods, meat or fish;			
14	(3) Contain or wrap flowers, potted plants or other items where dampness may be a problem;			
14	(4) Contain unwrapped prepared foods or bakery goods; or			
15	(5) A non-handled bag used to protect a purchased item from damaging or			
16	contaminating other purchased items when placed in a recyclable paper bag or reusable bag.			
17				
18	(b) Bags provided by pharmacists to contain prescription drugs.			
19	(c) Newspaper bags, door-hanger bags, laundry-dry cleaning bags or bags sold in packages containing multiple bags for uses such as food storage, garbage, pet waste or yard waste.			
20				
21	<i>Disposable bag fee</i> means a city fee imposed and required to be paid by each consumer making a purchase from a food store or small store for each disposable bag used during the			
	purchase assessed for the purpose of mitigating the impacts of disposable bags.			
22	Food store means a retail establishment or business located within Boulder city limits in a			
23	permanent building, operating year roundyear-round, that is a full-line, self-service market and which sells a line of staple foodstuffs, meats, produce or dairy products or other perishable items.			
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1	Food store does not include:
2	(a) Temporary vending establishment for fruits, vegetables, packaged meats and dairy.
3	(b) Vendors at farmer's markets or other temporary events.
-	(c) Businesses at which foodstuffs are an incidental part of the business. Food sales will be
4	considered to be <i>incidental</i> if such sales comprise no more than two percent of the business's gross sales in the City as measured by the dollar value of food sales as a
5	percentage of the dollar value of total sales at any single location.
6	Recycled paper carryout bag means a carryout bag made from one hundred percent
7	recycled material or other post-consumer content.
8	Retail food establishment means a retail operation that stores, prepares, or packages food
9	for human consumption or serves or otherwise provides food for human consumption to consumers directly or indirectly through a delivery service, whether such food is consumed on or
	off the premises or whether there is a charge for such food.
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11	<u>Retail food establishment does not include:</u>
12	(a) Any private home;
10	(b) Private boarding houses;
13	(c) Hospital and health facility patient feeding operations licensed by the state department of
14	health and environment;
1.5	(d) Child care centers and other child care facilities licensed by the state department of
15	human services;
16	(e) Hunting camps and other outdoor recreation locations where food is prepared in the field rather than at a fixed base of operation;
17	(f) Food or beverage wholesale manufacturing, processing, or packaging plants, or portions
1,	thereof, that are subject to regulatory controls under state or federal laws or regulations;
18	(g) Motor vehicles used only for the transport of food;
10	(h) Establishments preparing and serving only hot coffee, hot tea, instant hot beverages, and
19	nonpotentially hazardous doughnuts or pastries obtained from sources complying with all laws related to food and food labeling;
20	(i) Establishments that handle only nonpotentially hazardous prepackaged food and
	operations serving only commercially prepared, prepackaged foods requiring no
21	preparation other than the heating of food within its original container or package;
22	(j) Farmers markets and roadside markets that offer only uncut fresh fruit and vegetables for
	sale;
23	(k) Automated food merchandising enterprises that supply only prepackaged nonpotentially
24	hazardous food or drink or food or drink in bottles, cans, or cartons only, and operations
24	that dispense only chewing gum or salted nuts in their natural protective covering;
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1	(1) The donation, preparation, sale, or service of food by a nonprofit or charitable
2	organization in conjunction with an event or celebration if such donation, preparation, sale or service of food:
	(1) Does not exceed the duration of the event or celebration or a maximum of fifty-
3	two days within a calendar year; and
4	(2) Takes place in the county in which such nonprofit or charitable organization resides or is principally located.
5	(m) A home, commercial, private, or public kitchen in which a person produces food products sold directly to consumers pursuant to the "Colorado Cottage Foods Act," § 25-
6	<u>4-1614, C.R.S.</u>
7	<i>Reusable carryout bag</i> means a carryout bag that is designed and manufactured for at least
8	one hundred twenty-five uses, can carry at least twenty-two pounds over a distance of one hundred seventy-five feet, has stitched handles, and is made of cloth, fiber, or other fabric or a
9	recycled material such as polyethylene terephthalate (PET). Reusable Carryout Bag does not
10	include bags made of biologically based polymers such as corn or other plant sources; except that a carryout bag made of hemp is a reusable carryout bag if it is designed and manufactured in
11	accordance with this definition.
	Single-use plastic carryout bag means a carryout bag that is a single-use plastic product
12	made predominantly of plastic derived from natural gas, petroleum, or a biologically based source, such as corn or other plant sources, and that is provided to a customer at the point of sale.
13	Single-use plastic bag does not include a reusable carryout bag.
14	
15	<u>Small store means a store that operates solely in Colorado, has three or fewer locations in</u> the state, and is not part of a franchise, corporation, or partnership that has physical locations
16	outside of Colorado. Small store does not include any food store.
	<i>Store</i> means a grocery store, supermarket, convenience store, liquor store, dry cleaner,
17	pharmacy, drug store, clothing store, or other type of retail establishment at which disposable
18	bags are traditionally provided to customers. Store includes a food store, farmers' market, roadside market or stand, festival, or other temporary vendor or event that includes temporary
19	vendors. Store does not include a small store.
20	Recycled paper bag means a paper bag that is one hundred percent recyclable and contains
21	at least forty percent post-consumer recycled content.
22	<i>Reusable bag</i> means a bag that is:
23	(a) Designed and manufactured to withstand repeated uses over a period of time;
24	(b) Is made from a material that can be cleaned and disinfected regularly;
	 (c) That is at least 2.25 mil thick if made from plastic; (d) Has a minimum lifetime of seventy-five uses; and
25	(u) mas a minimum metime of sevency-five uses, and

Has the capability of carrying a minimum of eighteen pounds. (e)

6-15-3. Disposable Bag Fee Requirements.

- For each disposable bag provided to a customer, food stores shall collect from customers (a) and customers shall pay, at the time of purchase, a disposable bag fee of \$0.10. On and 4 after January 1, 2024, small stores shall collect from customers and customers shall pay, at the time of purchase, the disposable bag fee. 5
- The disposable bag fee imposed by the city is in lieu of the same state imposed carryout (b) 6 bag fee as defined in § 25-17-505, C.R.S.

7 On and after June 1, 2024, single-use plastic carryout bags will be prohibited at stores (c) and stores shall collect a disposable bag fee on recycled paper carryout bags only. 8 However, small stores shall continue to collect the disposable bag fee on all disposable 9 bags. Single-use plastic bags will not be prohibited at a retail food establishment if the retail food establishment (a) prepares or serves food in individual portions for immediate 10 on- or off-premises consumption; and (b) is not a grocery store or convenience store.

- 11 (d) Food sStores or small stores shall record the number of disposable bags provided and the total amount of disposable bag fees charged on the customer transaction receipt. 12
- A food store or small store shall not refund to the customer any part of the disposable bag $(\underline{e}\underline{e})$ 13 fee, nor shall the food store or small store advertise or state to customers that any part of the disposable bag fee will be refunded to the customer. 14
- (fd)A food store or small store shall not exempt any customer from any part of the disposable 15 bag fee for any reason except as stated in section 6-15-7, "Exemptions," B.R.C. 1981.

6-15-4. Retention, Remittance and Transfer of Disposable Bag Fee.

- A-food store or small store may retain forty percent of each disposable bag fee collected, (a) 18 which is the *retained percent*.
- 19 -The retained percent may only be used by the food store to: (b)-
 - (1)Provide educational information about the disposable bag fee to customers;
 - Provide the signage required by section 6-15-5, "Required Signage for Food (2)Stores." B.R.C. 1981:
 - (3)Train staff in the implementation and administration of the fee;
 - Improve or alter infrastructure to allow for the implementation, collection and (4)administration of the fee:
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1		(5) Collect, account for and remit the fee to the City;			
2		(6) Develop and display informational signage to inform consumers about the fee,			
3			encourage the use of reusable bags or promote recycling of plastic bags; and		
4		(7)	Improve infrastructure to increase plastic bag recycling.		
5	(<u>b</u> e)	The re sales ta	e retained percent shall not be classified as revenue for the purposes of calculating es tax.		
6 7	(<u>c</u> d)	The amount of the disposable bag fee collected by a <u>food</u> store <u>or small store</u> in excess of the retained percent shall be paid to the City and shall be used only as set forth in subsection (g) of this section to mitigate the effects of disposable bags in the City.			
8 9	(<u>d</u> e)	e) A food store or small store shall pay and the City shall collect all disposable bag f The City shall provide the necessary forms for food stores or small stores to file w			
10		City to	demonstrate compliance with the provisions of this chapter.		
11		If payment of any amount to the City is not received on or before the applicable due date, penalty and interest charges shall be added to the amount due as described in section 6-

13	(<u>e</u> f)	author	The disposable bag fee shall be administered by the city manager. The city manager is authorized to adopt interpretive rules pursuant to chapter 1-4, "Rulemaking," B.R.C. 1981, to implement this chapter, prescribe forms and provide methods of payment and		
14			tion and otherwise implement requirements of this chapter.		
15	(<u>f</u> g)	Funds from the disposable bag fee shall be used only for the expenditures that are			
16		follow	ed to mitigate the effects of disposable bags, including, without limitation, the ing:		
17 18		(1)	Administrative and enforcement costs associated with developing and		
			implementing the disposable bag fee.		
19 20		(2)	Activities of the City to: For any recycling, composting, or other waste diversion programs and related outreach and education activities.		
20		(3)	Activities of the City to:		
21			(A) Provide reusable carryout bags to residents and visitors;		
22					
23			(B) Educate residents, businesses and visitors about the impact of disposable bags on the City's environmental health, the importance of reducing the number of single use carryout bags entering the waste stream and the		
24			number of single-use carryout bags entering the waste stream and the		
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1			expenses associated with mitigating the <u>eaffects</u> of single-use bags on the City's drainage system, transportation system, wildlife and environment;		
2 3		(C)	Fund programs and infrastructure that allow the Boulder community to reduce waste associated with disposable bags;		
4		(D)	Purchase and install equipment designed to minimize bag pollution,		
5			including recycling containers and waste receptacles associated with disposable bags;		
6 7		(E)	Fund community cleanup events and other activities that reduce trash associated with disposable bags;		
8		(F)	Mitigate the effects of disposable bags on the City's drainage system, transportation system, wildlife and environment;		
9 10		(G)	Maintain a public website that educates residents on the progress of waste reduction efforts associated with disposable bags; and		
11		(H)	Fund the administration of the disposable bag fee program.		
12	(gh) No disposable bag fees collected in accordance with this chapter shall be used only for				
13	general government purposes.				
14	(<u>hi</u>) Disposable bag fees collected in accordance with this chapter shall be continually available for the uses and purposes set forth in subsection (g) of this section without				
15		regard to fiscal year limitation. No disposable bag fee funds shall be used for any purpose not authorized in this chapter.			
16	6-15-5	6-15-5. Required Signage for Food Stores.			
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18	Every food store or small store subject to the collection of the disposable bag fee shall display a sign in a location outside or inside of the business, viewable by customers, alerting customers to the City's disposable bag fee.				
19					
20	6-15-6. Requirement for Disposable Paper Bags.				
21	No food store or small store shall provide any paper bag that is not a recycled paper <u>carryout</u> bag.				
22	6-15-7. Exemptions.				
23	A food store or small store may provide a disposable bag to a customer at no charge if the				
24	customer provides evidence that he or she is a participant in a federal or state food assistance program.				
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6-15-8. Audits and Violations.

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(a) Each store or small store licensed pursuant to the provisions of this chapter shall maintain accurate and complete records of the disposable bag fees collected, the number of disposable bags provided to customers, the form and recipients of any notice required pursuant to this chapter and any underlying records, including any books, accounts, invoices or other records necessary to verify the accuracy and completeness of such records. It shall be the duty of each food store or small store to keep and preserve all such documents and records, including any electronic information, for a period of three years from the end of the calendar year of such records.

7 (b) If requested, each food-store or small store shall make its records available for audit by the city manager during regular business hours for the City to verify compliance with the provisions of this chapter. All such information shall be treated as confidential commercial documents.

(c) If any person fails, neglects or refuses to collect the disposable bag fee or underpays the 10 disposable bag fee, the city manager shall make an estimate of the fees due, based on available information, and shall add thereto penalties, interest and any additions to the 11 fees. The manager shall serve upon the delinquent food store or small store personally, by electronic mail or by first class mail directed to the last address of the food store or small 12 store on file with the City, written notice of such estimated fees, penalties and interest, constituting a Notice of Final Determination, Assessment and Demand for Payment, (also 13 referred to as "Notice of Final Determination") due and payable within twenty calendar days after the date of the notice. The food store or small store may request a hearing on 14 the assessment as provided in section 6-15-9, "Hearings," B.R.C. 1981.

6-15-9. Hearings.

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(a) A food-store or small store may request a hearing on any proposed fee imposed under this title after receiving a Notice of Final Determination by filing a written request for hearing within twenty calendar days of the date of mailing of the Notice of Final Determination. The request for hearing shall set forth the reasons for and amount of changes in the Notice of Final Determination that the food-store or small store seeks and such other information as the manager may prescribe.

(b) The city manager shall conduct the hearing under the procedures prescribed by chapter 1-3, "Quasi-Judicial Hearings," B.R.C. 1981, except that the manager shall notify the food store or small store in writing of the time and place of the hearing at least ten days before it is scheduled, unless the food-store or small store agrees to a shorter time. The hearing shall be held within sixty days of the date of receipt of the request for a hearing, unless the food-store or small store agrees to a later date.

1	Section 3. The provisions of this ordinance shall be effective January 1, 2023.			
2	Section 4. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this chapter is for any			
3	reason held invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction,			
4	such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this chapter.			
5	Section 5. This ordinance is necessary to protect the public health, safety, and welfare of			
6	the residents of the city, and covers matters of local concern.			
7	Section 6. The city council deems it appropriate that this ordinance be published by title			
8	only and orders that copies of this ordinance be made available in the office of the city clerk for			
9	public inspection and acquisition.
