 - HB23-1272, Tax Policy That Advances Decarbonization (Joseph, Fenberg) Provides income state tax credits for various purpose that advance decarbonization including EVs, e-bikes and sales and use tax exemption for heat pumps, and partially offsets the cost by decreasing the oil and gas industry's property tax credit

 - <u>SB23-285</u>, *Energy and Carbon Management Regulation in Colorado* Gives Colorado Oil Gas and Conservation Commission purview over geothermal and hydrogen resources.
 - <u>Status:</u> 4/19/2023 Senate Committee on Agriculture & Natural Resources Refer Amended to Appropriations
 - Staff Recommendation: Monitor
 - <u>SB23-291</u>, *Utility Regulation* (Fenberg) Implements policies in response to findings of General Assembly's "Joint Select Committee on Rising Utility Rates," such as limits utility's cost-recovery (executive and board compensation), caps costs utilities can charge to customers who are electrifying, limits investment in new gas infrastructure, and seeks to stabilize customer cost for natural gas.
 - Status: 4/18/2023 Introduced in Senate Assigned to Finance
 - Staff Recommendation: Support
 - Policy Statement Direction
 - Equity, Racial Justice and Social Resilience Dismantle institutional and systemic racism, prioritize voices, experiences, interests, and needs of communities that have been historically excluded, and reduce the vulnerabilities of groups most susceptible to natural or human caused stressors.

 - HB 23-1091, Continuation of Child Care Contribution Tax Credit Concerning the state income tax credit

 - Staff Recommendation: None
 - Policy Statement Direction: 24.(e) Support services that are culturally competent; language accessible; and meet the needs of populations with access barriers including transportation, work and childcare schedules;

- HB 23-1099 Portable Screening Report for Residential Leases Requires a landlord to accept from a
 prospective tenant a portable tenant screening report made available from a consumer reporting
 agency and not charge the prospective tenant either an application fee or a fee for the landlord to
 access or use the screening report.
 - Status: 4/13/2023 House Considered Senate Amendments Result was to Concur Repass

- HB 23-1120, Eviction Protections for Residential Tenants (Joseph) Requires a landlord and residential tenant to participate in mandatory mediation prior to commencing an eviction action if the residential tenant receives supplemental security income, federal social security disability insurance, or cash assistance through the Colorado works program
 - Status: 4/17/2023 Introduced in Senate Assigned to Local Government & Housing
 - Staff Recommendation: None
 - Policy Statement Direction: 18. Create, preserve, and expand federal affordable housing funding options
- HB 23-1186, Remote Participation in Residential Evictions
 - Status: 4/19/2023 Senate Third Reading Passed No Amendments
 - <u>Staff Recommendation:</u> None

 - <u>SB23-192</u> (Amend) Sunset Pesticide Applicators Act Sunset Revision Seeking to amend to strike the state preemption of local control to regulate pesticides.
 - <u>SB23-200</u> (Support & Amend) Expands municipal authority to operate photo radar cameras to enforce traffic safety.
 - <u>SB23-213</u> (Pending) Establishes a state and local government framework for assessing statewide
 housing needs and creates model codes for the regulation of higher density housing options, transitoriented areas, key corridors, manufactured housing, and other model housing strategies
