The goal of the grant is to increase the exposure of students to unique and memorable experiences that may shape their future in cultural participation and creative careers.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

• General eligibility. Meets all general eligibility requirements.

• Open to educators, administrators, and presenters. Classroom teachers and school administrators in public schools, private schools, home school associations, and non-traditional classroom settings, as well as artists / individuals / organizations collaborating with schools on programming are eligible.

- Service area and programming. Projects must have a significant component of public programming that takes place within the city limits of Boulder. This programming must meet the criteria described in the Chapter 14-1-2 of the City of Boulder Revised Code. For organizations, the applicant must demonstrate that they are headquartered in the city limits of Boulder. For individuals, the applicant must demonstrate that they reside at a permanent household address in the city limits of Boulder. Applicants may also demonstrate that they are partnered with a Boulder-based artist or organization. Examples of documentation to demonstrate being headquartered or residing in Boulder may include a utility bill, phone bill, pay stub, renter's or mortgage bill, lease, insurance policy, or other official document. P.O. Boxes are not acceptable. The term "city limits of Boulder" is defined in the Boulder Valley Comprehensive Plan. For additional information on the planning area and Comprehensive Plan visit this link. As a shorthand, office staff use addresses with the zip code starting with 803— to determine if it is in the acceptable area.
- Timing. Projects must take place after the grant deadline and end before the end of the 2024 spring semester.

REVIEW PROCESS

- Deliberation. Applications are reviewed by the Boulder Arts Commission grants panel. Final funding decisions are made at public Boulder Arts Commission meetings. See schedule.
- Evaluation of applications. Funding in previous years does not imply continued support. Each application is reviewed anew in the context of current policies and applications. Applicants that have received repeated funding should be aware that the Boulder Arts Commission looks for indication of growth and a fresh approach to their work.
- Evaluation criteria

APPEALS PROCESS

GRANT AWARDS

Notifications and dispersal of funds. Staff notifies all applicants if their Application has been successful
and begins the process of securing supporting information and issuing payment for successful
applicants. Grantees must contact the grant coordinator to arrange for payment. Checks are sent by mail
or electronically to bank accounts designated by the applicant.

• Communications. All official communications and notifications will be made to the named individual applicant or person designated as the organization contact. It is this person's responsibility to communicate Boulder Arts Commission requirements of the grant award to collaborators or other participants. This includes, but is not limited to, requirements for compliance with grant agreements, identifying Boulder Arts Commission sponsorship on publicity materials, and reporting.

- Implementation. Grantees shall implement programs / projects as outlined in the grant application. Any change to the project, venue, Grantee address, schedule, or staff / team members must be reported to culturegrants@bouldercolorado.gov.
- Award amount. The Boulder Arts Commission reserves the right to adjust the amount of a grant award offered to an Applicant.
- **PERA impacts**. Retirees affiliated with the Colorado Public Employees Retirement Association (PERA) will be impacted by a withholding requirement enacted by the Colorado State Legislature if awarded an arts grant. Details are available on the PERA website. See "Disclosure of Compensation."
- Vendor Forms. Grantees must submit a City of Boulder vendor form and current IRS W-9 form in order to
 receive the grant award. The W-9 must be in the same name as the Grantee named on the grant
 application. Individual Grantees must also submit a Determination of Independent Contractor / Employee
 Status for Payment document and copy of their Driver's License. Applicants will receive the appropriate
 forms from payments@bouldercolorado.gov. Failure to supply a proper W-9 may invalidate the grant
 award.
- IRS taxation. Grant awards are non-transferable, taxable and are reported to the federal government.
- Agreement. When a grant award is made by the Boulder Arts Commission, the successful Applicant will be contacted by staff to sign a Gant Letter of Agreement. In that agreement, the Grantee will indicate the completion date of the project and the date a grant report will be submitted.
- Issuance of funding checks. Once the agreement is signed, staff of the Office of Arts and Culture will submit it to City Finance along with the invoice. Funds/checks are delivered within the next three weeks. Grants are initially funded at 80 percent of the grant amount awarded. The remaining 20 percent of the grant awarded is paid out upon receipt and Boulder Arts Commission approval of the grant report. Failure to submit a final grant report will result in ineligibility to apply for future grants.
- Acknowledgment of Boulder Arts Commission funding. All publicity for Boulder Arts Commission-funded projects must include the following credit line: *This project is funded (or funded in part) by a grant from the Boulder Arts Commission, an agency of the Boulder City Council.* In lieu of the credit line, the Boulder Arts Commission Logo may be used. The Grantee must sign a release form and submit photographs and/or videos of the project that the Office and Arts and Culture may use on its website, social media, printed materials or for any other publicity purpose.
- Thanking City Council. It is suggested that all grant recipients write the Boulder City Council members to
 thank them for supporting the Boulder Arts Commission and the Office of Arts and Culture. Please let

T2 Dance Company (T2) proposes to bring the Color Wheel Project (CWP) to three Boulder Valley Schools in the 2023/24 school year, including Bear Creek Elementary (confirmed) and Flatirons Elementary (confirmed). CWP is an educational program designed for elementary students to gain an understanding of how visual arts and dance can intersect to create unique works of art.

The CWP combines dance with visual arts, providing students with arts experiences and opportunities that they would otherwise not have. The program looks like this, though it is tailored to meet the needs of each school:

- 1. T2 works with the visual arts students. This initial lesson includes a fun movement warm-up followed by a blind contour drawing that is transformed into movement through dance composition activities.
- 2. Students create visual art works that represent their favorite color.
- 3. Artworks are submitted to T2 with assistance from T2 as needed.
- 4. T2 Dancers select artworks to use as inspiration for creating a production. At least one artwork will be selected from each participating school.
- 5. T2 creates the dance production.
- 6. Culminating production at the Dairy Arts Center.

Project calendar*

August through November 2023: Lessons from the T2 Dancers at the schools. Students create visual artworks and submit to T2.

Benefit to students*

CWP is an open-ended approach to creating art using color as the connector. It is intended for participating artists to create art based on their favorite color. When submitting artwork to T2, students are asked to justify how their favorite color has been interpreted in their work. Submission is an online form - T2 staff works with the school teachers to assist with these submissions.

The CWP production at the Dairy Arts Center will be recorded and provided to each participating school for any students who are not able to make it to the live performance. This will include a slideshow of all artworks projected as the audience enters the theater. The selected artworks will be on display at the theater as well as the T2 website.

There will be a pre-show mini dance class for any children, whether they have participated in the CWP or not, to learn a portion of dance choreography that they will then see in the show. This will be presented thirty minutes prior to each show. Three shows will be presented to provide options for families.

Students will not only have the opportunity to work with professional dancers in their classes - they will also see how their artworks were transformed into a full dance production.

The Color Wheel Project is aligned with the Colorado Department of Education standards for Dance and Visual Arts. Activities include creating visual artworks, completing crosswords about color and dance performance, choreographing dances, and completing questions designed to encourage reflection, evaluation, and critical thinking.

There is a study guide provided to each school including activities for the students to complete. T2 plans to translate the study guide into Spanish for the 23/24 school year if funding is awarded.

Proposed outcomes and evaluation strategy*

T2 has a strategic plan from which several approaches to project outcomes and evaluation strategies were created. One of the short-term goals is to expand community programming by connecting with BVSD schools. The Color Wheel Project (CWP) is one way that T2 seeks to establish relationships with local schools and aims to continue development of these relationships to make the CWP an annual event that teachers can build into their curriculum.

Oualitative Evaluation:

- a. Participant surveys completed by the teachers involved directly with the program, however there will be questions designed to provide T2 with quantitative and qualitative data directly from the students, such as comments, anecdotes and reactions from students, and samples of completed activities.
- b. Post-project meeting. T2 staff meets with the Board of Directors for a post-event evaluation meeting.
- c. Feedback cards loosely placed in the programs at the show. A box will be available for completed cards at the show and an announcements will be made to inform and remind the audience.

Quantitative Evaluation:

- a. Audience numbers.
- b. Number of audience members from participating schools.
- c. Number of bookings of the CWP for 2024/25, particularly repeating schools.

Color Wheel Project (CWP) is an arts package that can be shared and experienced by all students collectively. It provides arts integration experiences and a professional performance where all students can come together and see the artworks created from each school. It is important that all students have the opportunity to see professional dance. But more importantly, participating students will have the opportunity to engage in all aspects of the arts that encompass the CWP.

CWP provides the T2 Company Dancers with an opportunity to explore their own choreography and adopt a leadership role as they choreograph new works on each other inspired by student artworks. It also provides young elementary school artists with understanding of how their art can influence and relate to other art forms. CWP emphasizes an authentic expression of diversity by encouraging each artist involved to explore their own voice and creative identity.

T2 is working toward growth artistically and strategically. By connecting with with artists and schools the company is building its own resilience and sustainability as an arts organization focused on community benefit. With grant funds, CWP is 100% free for participating schools.

The CWP supports the T2 Dancers by providing an avenue to choreograph and present their own artistic work - something not often offered in most dance companies. The culminating performance is open to all, adding performing arts in the public realm while connecting youth to the art itself. The performance will be presented live in the theater. There will also be a virtual ticket option available for those that are not able to be present. Discounted tickets will be provided to senior centers with whom T2 has been developing relationships.

T2 will work directly with the teachers of each school to ensure they receive a tailored experience. T2 is also looking into translating the study guide into Spanish.

According to Americans for the Arts, 97 percent of elementary schools nationwide don't offer dance. In addition, in 2008, African-American and Hispanic students had less than half of the access to arts education than their White peers. Undertaking CWP in BVSD schools will integrate dance into arts education that is already happening in schools, and ensure underrepresented students receive quality arts education. Keeping long term impact in mind, T2 hopes CWP will be a catalyst for increasing equitable arts education in schools. It's been shown that low-income students who are highly engaged in the arts are twice as likely to graduate college as their peers with no arts education (Americans for the Arts). This project is a starting point to demonstrate the value of the arts in schools.

Integrating students' artwork into the performance is vital to diversity inclusion for the CWP, giving all students an opportunity to express their individuality through the interpretation of their favorite color.
