The Trail Crew Life

The beginning of summer can be an exciting time for youth in the Boulder area! For over the past 50 years the Junior Ranger Program has given 14-17 year olds the opportunity to join crews and jump straight into trail work. During a 4 week session each crew takes on a variety of maintenance projects. Crews maintain drainage structures to keep water off trail, clear vegetation that is creeping into the corridor, and train their eye to assess the maintenance needs of individual trails. Conservation crews also assist adult trail crews with projects such as clearing combustible materials to mitigate potential forest fires and

installing fencing to allow trampled areas near trails to revegetate. Trail crew members perform a variety of work beyond just trail maintenance including forestry, invasive species removal, and occasionally help with agricultural projects. The Junior Ranger Program provides a balanced work experience that not only accomplishes trail work goals but also provides employees with an understanding of why the work they do is so valuable to the City of Boulder.


CREW SNAPSHOTS

YOUTH RANGER CREW

We started off our first week by visiting the Flagstaff Mountain Top Shop to learn about the different responsibilities Open Space and Mountain Park Rangers have on a day to day basis. The very next day, our crew visited the Thorne Nature Experience in order to capture and band different species of birds. Week one finished up with a CPR & First Aid course held at Boulder County's Parks and Open Space headquarters. The following week started off with a bang! We learned about wildland fire response from the only wildland fire station in the city. Just next door Ranger Sim led the afternoon in a master class about Ranger safety and defensive tactics. The week ended with a bat ecology research night which helps to monitor the bat species within Open Space and Mountain Parks. Our crew then got to experience a variety of work projects. Everything from forestry, trail building, to a youth fishing program was the third week's focus. In our final days we conducted a full search and rescue scenario which was then quickly followed up by a visit from a Flight for Life medical rescue helicopter. Finally, Ranger Hatfield demonstrated how Rangers handle intrusive wildlife using corrective behavior techniques.

The Youth Ranger and Conservation/Trails Crews work together to build a new nature trail at the CU Mountain Research Station.





SESSION II JUNIOR RANGER LIFE

The second session of Junior Rangers always start off to a quick start! With four fresh crews of Junior Rangers, each crew of ten or eleven jumps right into field work. Crews maintain drainage structures to keep water off trail, clear vegetation that is creeping into the corridor, train their eye to assess the maintenance needs of individual trails. and assist other OSMP workgroups on a number of other conservation projects. In 2019, crews assisted adult trail crews on three different capital trail projects - a reroute of the Fern/Mesa and Green Mountain West Ridge trails and а water management rock project on Doudy Draw. Junior Rangers also assisted FEMP (Forestry), Vegetation Management, Restoration, and Trailheads crews.

SESSION ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Over the course of four weeks Junior Rangers participated in the following:

- Three different capital trail projects
- Moving 8 tons of road base in one day on Doudy Draw
- A week long sustainability challenge
- Trail maintenance projects
- Resume building workshop by program staff
- Weekly Ecological Restoration and/or Vegetation Management projects
- A forest fire ecology and management lesson by a graduate Junior Ranger and Youth Ranger
- Weekly FEMP (Forestry) projects
- Environmental Education lesson on birds, fishing, and outdoor recreation by OSMP Outreach staff
- An accessibility hike with Topher Downham



SUSTAINABILITY WEEK



Sustainability Week

During week 3 all four crews participated in a sustainability week challenge. Junior Rangers and program staff were encouraged to travel to and from work in any form of alternate transportation. Each form of transportation, whether it be bike, foot, bus, scooter, or carpool was worth different point values. The number of miles traveled using alternate transportation was taken into account to figure out which crew won in each category below. Though in the end every participant was a winner!

Total miles for each crew below: **Crew 1:** Bike/Walk - 81 miles Bus - 97 miles Carpool - 49.5 miles Total - 227.5 miles using alternate transporation!

Crew 2:

Bike/Walk - 36 miles Bus - 256 miles Carpool - 137 miles Total - 429 miles using alternate transporation!



Crew 3: Bike/Walk - 66 miles Bus - 169 miles Carpool - 116 miles Total - 351 miles using alternate transporation!

Bike/Walk - 138 miles Bus - 116 miles Carpool - 122 miles Total - 376 miles using alternate transporation!
