Welcome & Introductions



Cool Blocks Model Presentation

Thomas Ruprecht, who had connected with a friend in Los Angeles and learned about the Cool Blocks program, presented the model which the association has chosen to follow. Cool Blocks was only very recently opened to new neighborhoods once their extensive pilot phase was completed. Sundance will be the first Cool Blocks demonstration in Colorado and will share their experience and learnings with other Boulder neighborhoods and beyond. A few key images are captured below. - 3. For the purposes of the forum, select priority action items from each Cool Block action plan and set a time for completion.


presentation was well received. The facilitator, Sunny Walker, then gave an overview of the Mural platform which would be used to capture action ideas.



Rather than the previous ANCA format of an open- ended participant response to a vision question, given that the Cool Blocks model already has precise actions that have been shown to lower a neighborhood's carbon footprint, the group was randomly divided into four breakout groups to look at the 8 topics (2 per group) listed on the agenda and to choose initial actions from what Cool Blocks recommended. 






IMAGE OF THE WHOLE MURAL BOARD

About ANCA

Accelerate Neighborhood Climate Action was formed initially by a group of Denver colleagues who saw a need to involve Denver residents in the City's sustainability efforts. The word "Neighborhood" was added to the name as it had become the vehicle through which to engage people.

ANCA was incorporated as a 501(c)3 charitable organization in March of 2019. To date (4-3-2021) 12 Climate Action Forums, 11 in Denver covering 13 neighborhoods and 1 in Boulder, have been completed with nearly 50 neighborhood level Action Plans created. Interchange events between these neighborhoods are held twice a year. In December of 2019, ANCA was invited to present their work at Denver's Sustainability Summit.

The City of Boulder saw a similar need and in collaboration with ANCA Denver launched their own ANCA program with a city-wide Climate Action Forum demonstration on November 14, 2020. The city is continuing with 5 specific neighborhood "pilots" in 2021.

- Phase One: Martin Acres, Sundance, and Goss Grove
- Phase Two: HyView and Melody Catalpa
