

## LEARNING TOGETHER: Crime Trends

The Boulder Police Department is engaged in evidence-based policing, and this includes using data to help understand public safety. Understanding crime trends helps raise awareness about seasonal issues and various kinds of community concerns. This explainer uses the publicly available data from the **Boulder Crime Dashboard**.

Person related offenses, property related offenses, and offenses that are not those categories are presented below from January 2021 to February 2022. The crime trends indicate that crime is not random; there was a spike in property offenses in January 2021, and a spike in all other offenses in August 2021.

In January 2021 there were over 700 property offenses. The top 10 kinds of property offenses were: Open Crime Data from January 2021 - February 2022

According to the crime trends, there were over 600 offenses in August 2021 that were not categorized as person or property offenses. The top 10 kinds of offenses were:

Trespassing	27
Dog license required	26
Tents and nets prohibited	24
Obstructing peace officer/firefighter	22
